All Victorian government school teachers meet the registration requirements of the Victorian Institute of Teaching (www.vit.vic.edu.au).

This school meets prescribed minimum standards for registration as set down by the Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority (VRQA) in accordance with the Education and Training Reform Act 2006, inclusive of those schools granted an exemption by the VRQA under minimum standard 2.1 'Student enrolment numbers' and/or 3.1 'Curriculum framework – languages program' until 31 December 2013.



About Our School

The school is located in a quiet residential neighbourhood surrounded by housing on three sides but with a main road and large nature reserve on the other. An appreciation of the environment and native vegetation is evident with lots of trees and vegetation around the buildings and school grounds.

We are an IB World School authorised to deliver the Primary Years Programme of the International Baccalaureate. In line with the IBO philosophy, our school vision is to develop, in partnership with the whole school community, an effective, caring and dynamic learning community. We offer a full range of AusVELS Specialist subjects in Visual Arts, Library, Languages, Performing Arts and Physical Education and have many enrichment opportunities across the curriculum.

Current enrolment is 650 with a good gender balance of approximately 50:50 girls/boys. The school's Student Family Occupation (SFO) index is 0.2 with 6.2% of families in receipt of the Education Maintenance Allowance (EMA) Within the Beaumaris North PS community there is a low level of household movement indicating a generally stable community. We currently have a 1:21 teacher student ratio in our year levels.


The school has 40.59 equivalent full time teachers, 3 Principal class officers and 7.37 Education Support staff.

Our combined student learning outcomes are well above Victorian Government Primary School medians. Our students are performing at a predicted level given our student cohort.	Student Engagement has been a focus in 2013 with an increase in profile and responsibilities of our Student Leadership Program. School programs are reviewed annually based on student assessment data. In 2014 a non-teaching Curriculum Coordinator has been employed to oversee the AusVELS and PYP Curriculum, student data and to identify specific intervention programs and foci. In 2014, we will focus on Numeracy, Literacy and Science. Science specialists will work with teachers to enhance skills and embed Science into their Units of Inquiry, further enriching the students' learning experience.	Student Attitudes to School data derived from the Attitudes to School survey is higher than similar schools and above the median of all Victorian Government schools. Our 3 year data in all areas of Student Relationships, Wellbeing and Teaching and Learning is on the upward trend. Our school mean scores are higher than both region and state results. This program provides an interest and passion	All BNPS staff are trained in the principles of Restorative Justice. We are a KidsMatter School with two trained staff as faciltators. Current Student Wellbeing Programs include Kimochi, Friends for Life, Girls on the Go, Boys on the Bounce, You Can Do It. Our school employs a 0.6 Wellbeing Officer who works with all year levels in planning sessions providing strategies for all teaching staff on the social and emotional wellbeing of the students. She also provides individual support and guidance for staff, students and parents as required.
We will also focus on our engagement with the Studies of Asian Literacies and participate in the Leading 21st Century Schools project. NAPLAN, the On Demand Assessment facility, and the ACER Online testing to inform all student achievement needs and areas for focus. The report from our 2013 IBO PYP Evaluation verified our exemplary curriculum and student achievement.		Our Wellbeing team also offers Parent Information sessions encompassing Parenting Skills, Building Resilience in Children and School Readiness knowledge. Throughout 2013 we have focussed on meeting the standards, policies and procedures required to obtain our eSmart accreditation. We use the data derived from school based surveys of staff, students and parents to inform, support and add value to our current programs. Results in this area are




What are student outcomes?

Student outcomes show the achievements of students in this school in English and Mathematics. They also show results in national literacy and numeracy tests and, for secondary colleges, the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) examinations. They provide important information about student attendance and engagement at school.

For secondary colleges, the Performance Summary also provides information about how many students at this school go on to further studies or full-time work after leaving school.

You can see these results for the latest year, as well as the average of the last four years (where available).

The Performance Summary also allows you to compare student outcomes for students at this school with the outcomes of students in all other Victorian government schools.



Additionally, NAPLAN relative growth charts are provided for each of the NAPLAN domains. These compare a student's current year NAPLAN result to the results of all 'similar' Victorian students (i.e. students in all sectors in the same year level who had the same NAPLAN score two years prior).

If the current year result is in the top 25% their growth level is categorised as 'High', the middle 50% is categorised as 'Medium' and the bottom 25% is categorised as 'Low'.

Percentage of students from this school in the High, Medium and Low NAPLAN relative growth categories.




What is a School Comparison?

The *School comparison* is a way of comparing school performance that takes into account the different student intake characteristics of each school.

A *School comparison* takes into account the school's academic intake, the socio-economic background of students, the number of Indigenous students, the number of non-English speaking and refugee students, the number of students with a disability, and the size and location of the school.

The School comparison measures show that most schools are doing well and are achieving results that are 'similar' to what we would estimate given the background characteristics of their students. Some schools are doing exceptionally well with the students they have, and have 'higher' performance. Some schools have 'lower' performance after taking into account their students' characteristics – these schools will receive targeted support to ensure that there is improvement.



Looking at both the student outcomes and school comparisons provides important information about what a school is doing well and the areas that require further improvement.

What is the meaning of 'Data not available'?

Financial performance and position commentary

During 2013 we further improved our physical learning environments, by removing walls, and renovating classroom space. The excellent support received by our parent community, has enabled the use of the Building Maintenance Fund to undertake these works. Our school continues to enjoy a strong support base from the families, and many projects are able to take place because of this. A perfect example is the Playscape Project, which this year, completed a new stage beside our Canteen, Seahorse Cove. Financially our school utilised available school financial resources to maximize the learning needs of our students. We purchased Ipads, laptops, and large Televisions . We increased our technical support and professional development activities to guarantee our ICT program continues to meet eSmart accreditation standards. Maintenance of our grounds continues to draw on our funds, particularly with trees needing constant care. In 2013 we employed a handyman for 0.4 EFT which is greatly assisting us in ensuring we maintain an OH&S focus at all times.
